

Winston Churchill's original handwritten manuscript for one of his only works of fiction, a short story derived from his Boer War experiences, completed in 1901, which would be published on December 18, 1902 in *Youth's Companion* magazine in the U.S., followed in March 1903 by U.K. publication in *Windsor Magazine*. Apparently completed, if not entirely written during Churchill's first lecture tour of the United States, which commenced December 1, 1900 and ended February 1, 1901, the manuscript comprised 25 handwritten pages, all in Churchill's hand, in ink, with numerous edits and emendations. The short story is known as the third and virtually last work of fiction that Churchill composed.



Churchill's first book: True-life military adventures drawn from newspaper despatches filed by the 22-year-old correspondent while serving on India's Afghanistan-bordering Northwest Frontier under Major-General Sir Bindon Blood. Wrenching to read how little has changed in this region since Churchill's time.





More blood and guts reportage by young Winston, the war correspondent, here in his second book delivering a brilliant history of British involvement in the Sudan and an account of the fierce campaign for its reconquest that Churchill himself participated in and, in many significant ways, disapproved of. Published in two large, lavish and, today, extremely rare volumes. All subsequent editions were significantly abridged.

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


A very good copy of the Second Printing, which the publisher designated as "Second Edition," but which bibliographer Ronald Cohen argues is really more a second printing, with very modest changes made to the text and overall layout of the book. To the naked eye it appears identical to the First Edition, particularly in this very attractive example, which is bright and tight, with rich red cloth and little perceptible spine fade. There is a hint of shelf wear and a few faint scuffs. The contents are fine and unfoxed.

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MR. BRODRICK'S ARMY & FOR FREE TRADE

1903 & 1906

The holy grail of Churchill book collecting. These two softcover compendiums of Churchill's early Parliamentary speeches – respectively, opposing plans for expanding England's peace-time army, and advocating for Free Trade – were published in very limited numbers by Arthur L. Humphreys, General Manager of Hatchard's, the venerable London bookshop. Both books were identically bound in unprepossessing red printed card wraps that did not age well. The surviving handful of copies (fewer than twenty for each) today constitute the stuff of collectors' dreams.





Inscribed and signed on the first free endpaper of Volume I to: "Charles Longman from Winston S. Churchill, Jan. 1, 1906" (the day before publication).

Churchill had published all of his previous books with Charles Longman's firm of

Longmans, Green and Co. His asking price, however, for the right to publish his planned biography of his father, Lord Randolph Churchill, was too high for Longman. Ultimately, Frederick Macmillan acquired the book for an 8,000 pound advance. Longman believed Macmillan had overpaid. He was wrong. The book wound up selling 6,250 copies.



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MY AFRICAN JOURNEY

Big game hunting with young Churchill as guide; a travelogue of Britain's East Africa territories written by the then-Under Secretary of State for the Colonies. The First English edition is coveted for its hand-some cover woodcut of the author posed beside a trophy rhinoceros.



LIBERALISM AND THE SOCIAL PROBLEM

Churchill's first widely distributed hardcover collection of political speeches, expressing "radical" liberal views that were quite advanced for his time, prefiguring the modern social safety net that Churchill and David Lloyd George would set in motion.

Churchill's *The People's Rights* was actually part of a trilogy of Liberal Party campaign treatises, along with *The People's Budget* and *The People's Insurance* (published in 1911), which were authored by Churchill's running mate, David Lloyd George. All three books were produced in virtually identical softcover formats by Hodder & Stoughton, printed on cheap, acidic paper that deteriorated quickly, and all three are today rarely seen. This was a rare complete set in generally very good, if typically weathered, condition.

THE WORLD CRISIS



MY EARLY LIFE

Arguably Winston Churchill's most entertaining book, a memoir of youth and wayward school boyhood — in fact, the only volume of personal memoirs that Churchill ever wrote. Published in the U.S. under the title "A Roving Commission," the work is available today in a variety of endlessly reissued editions. True first editions, however, remain quite rare.

This was the practice of the publisher for copies exported to Canada and Australia, resulting in three small triangular gashes in this beautifully printed jacket.

Churchill's majestic biography of the first Duke of Marlborough, John Churchill; soldier, statesmen, hard-headed Churchillian ancestor. Initially published in England as a lush four-volume set and then as a six-volume set in the U.S.

Churchill. Christmas 1942." Also present, in addition to the seven war speech volumes, were two post-war speech compilations, The Sinews Of Peace and In The Balance, each uniformly rebound in crushed blue Morocco leather. According to John Colville, "Churchill owed more, and admitted that he owed more" to Ismay "than to anybody else, military or civilian, in the whole of the war."

From Winston Churchill's wartime engagement diary, three original cards which sat on his Downing Street desk throughout the war. Covering the months of July, August, November and December 1943 and January and February 1945, each monthly page was pasted recto and verso onto a double-sided board file-punched at the upper right corner. The entries were largely in ink, with a few in pencil, all in secretarial hand (mostly John Colville's). They detailed Churchill's minutest daily movements during critical periods of the war, including the Teheran and Yalta Conferences. The names of Churchill's greatest wartime contemporaries, including King George VI, FDR, Stalin, Eisenhower and Chang Kai-Shek, appeared throughout, often for luncheon and dinner dates.

THE SECOND WORLD WAR

1948-53

The best-selling six-volume history that helped gain Churchill a Nobel Prize for literature. Published first in the U.S., the ensuing English edition contained numerous corrections and even a few additional maps. It is therefore considered more definitive, but the American is the true first.

Five post-war speech compilation volumes were published, beginning with "The Sinews Of Peace" in 1948 (late-1945-1946 speeches, including the legendary Fulton, Missouri, "Iron Curtain" speech); "Europe Unite" in 1950 (1947-48); "In the Balance" in 1951 (1949-50); "Stemming the Tide" in 1953 (1951-52); and "The Unwritten Alliance" in 1961, the final collection of Churchill speeches, covering the years 1953-1959. This book appeared in England only and is perhaps the rarest of the postwar speech volumes.





Beginning in 1961, the British and American publishers of Churchill's *A History of the English-Speaking Peoples* began issuing spin-off volumes that repackaged excerpts from the four-volume set. This was the third such publication, a fascinating collection of thirteen extracted personality profiles of (what the publisher termed) Churchill's "favorite characters." A fourteenth chapter is devoted to Churchill himself, also in his own words. The book was intended for younger readers. A very good copy in a price-clipped dust jacket.

Discovered among the estate papers of a member of Churchill's secretarial staff, this carefully preserved cigar butt was wrapped in a small fragment of notepaper bearing the handwritten ink notation: "Cigar smoked by Mr. Churchill on Jan. 30th, 1952 at a cabinet at No. 10 Downing St. the day after his return from USA."

Churchill had just landed at Southampton aboard the Queen Mary following a three week visit to the United States, during which he had met extensively with President Truman on the subject of the Korean War, among other matters. The cigar butt was 3 1/2-inches long and very much showed its age but was entirely intact, preserved in a sealed glass cigar tube together with the original handwritten note.
